## From Fr Neil

#### **JESUS, GIVE US THE LIVING WATER**

"It shouldn't have been like this!" As the Hebrews left slavery in Egypt, we can imagine they thought they would have a great future ahead of them. They trusted Moses' leadership and that God was finally freeing them. But now in the first reading (Ex 17:3-7) we see that all is not going well. We can imagine them saying, "It shouldn't have been like this". They are tormented by thirst, and they are complaining. Now that they have run out of water, they feel that God is distant; they no longer trust God. They complained about why they were in the desert. Moses was afraid they might even stone him. Instead of trusting in God, they did the very opposite—they put God to the test. The Psalm invites us: O that today you would listen to his voice! Harden not your hearts as at Meribah. (Ps 95:7-8)

The first reading is not just about the Hebrews in the desert. The first reading is also about us. So when things are not as we think they should be, "Keep calm and carry on". Maybe sometimes we murmur because we focus on what we don't have or what we think we should have, rather than focusing on what God has already done for us. The Hebrews in the desert forgot one fundamental point: God had a plan for them and would see that plan through. Do we forget God has a plan for us and will provide for us?

In today's Gospel we have the meeting between Jesus and the Samaritan woman at the well. There are actually a lot of nuances in this Gospel by John but let us zero in on the message which is contained in the exchange between the two. Jesus began by asking the woman to give Him a drink. The woman was tentative because Jesus was a Jew. Jesus told the woman that if she knew Him, she would be the one asking for water to drink. Jesus revealed Himself to the woman. Jesus presented Himself as the living water, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again; but whoever drinks the water I shall give will never thirst; the water I shall give will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life." (John 4:14). Thus, the woman asked for that DRINK.

God also had a plan for the woman of Samaria (John 4:5-42). It seemed just like any other day. She was coming to the well on her own instead of with the women of the town, probably because she may have felt excluded due to her past. There she met Jesus and he knew everything about her, about her past, and her marriages. But Jesus also had a plan for her, and that plan was to lead her to him. Instead of the water of her plans, Jesus offered himself as the water to sustain. Jesus uncovered her past so that what was sinful could be healed. She came to the well bringing an empty water jar but she found much more than water, so she left her jar by the well and hurried back to the townspeople—whom she had been avoiding—to tell them that she may have found the Messiah. Just as the Hebrews in the desert in the first reading are a warning to us, the woman of Samaria is an example to us. By sheer grace, like her, we have heard Jesus offer us living water

The significance of the encounter between Jesus and the Samaritan woman has many levels. The first is personal: The woman is herself converted to belief in Jesus as Messiah because he knows her sin but speaks with her just the same. The second is social: Having come to know Jesus as the Messiah, the Samaritan woman becomes an evangelist to her own people. The third level of the story is

#### What is the role of archdeacon in Anglican church?

An archdeaconry is a legal division of a diocese for administrative purposes within which the archdeacon exercises an ordinary jurisdiction. The essential nature of the role has been described as 'being a good steward so that others are freed to be the worshipping, witnessing and ministering Church'. He is also responsible for the area's church buildings and pastoral care for clergy.

educational: Jesus uses his encounter with the Samaritan woman to teach his disciples that God's mercy is without limit. The disciples return from their shopping quite confused to find Jesus talking with a Samaritan, and a woman at that! But the conversion of the Samaritan townspeople is a foretaste of the kind of open community that will be created among those who believe that Jesus is the Messiah.

## Annual Meeting; Sunday, 19th March (following 9.30am service)

There are currently positions vacant on Parish Council, so please commit to prayer whether you have some skills that would be of use on Council. Nomination forms are available at the back of the church.

### Budget 2023

Parish Council is currently developing the budget for 2023 to be presented at the AGM on 19<sup>th</sup> March. Unfortunately, our weekly giving has dropped significantly with a total reduction of 20% over the last two years. This affects our ability to maintain full-time ministry in the parish.

Keeping our Church open and maintained, with a full-time priest requires approx. \$3,865 per week.

Currently, we receive on average per week:

Belltower op Shop	\$1,020
Fundraising	\$ 340
Hall Hire etc.	\$ 145
Current Giving	\$1,790
Total	\$3,295

That is a shortfall of around (\$570) per week. Currently we have approximately 33 parishioners who give regularly.

To meet the shortfall we would require a 32% increase in giving, or 11 new families willing to give \$50 per week.

A parishioner currently giving

\$20 per week	16% increase = \$3	32% increase = \$6
\$50 per week	16% increase = \$8	32% increase = \$16
\$100 per week	16% increase = \$16	32% increase = \$32

The Parish Council is looking for your feedback on how we can turn this situation around in order to maintain a full-time priest in the Parish.
